

Because its flaming red leaves resemble the star of Bethlehem, with the red leaves of the

poinsettia symbolizing the blood of Christ, the poinsettia has become the most popular Christmas plant.

It originally grew in Central America and was introduced into the United States by Dr. Joel Roberts Poinsett who was Ambassador to Mexico. In 1829, he brought it back with him when he returned home to South Carolina. There is a Mexican legend which explains the origin of the "flower of the Holy Night."

One Christmas Eve a poor, young Mexican boy had no gift for the Holy Child. He didn't know what to do and his steps were heavy as he slowly made his way to church.

When he reached the church, he knelt on the ground outside and prayed to God: "I am very poor but I love you. I wish I had a gift to give to your Son on his birthday."

As he finished praying, he stood up and there at his feet he was surprised to see a green plant with dazzling red leaves. He gently broke the flower from the plant, carried it inside and laid it before the Christ Child.

The poinsettia blooms every year at Christmas time and has become symbolic of the holi-day spirt.
